

Small Group Questions | Comfort My People | Isaiah 40:1-11

Isaiah 40:1–11 begins with a message of comfort to God’s people in exile, assuring them their suffering is not the end. God declares their sin has been addressed and promises to come as an active deliverer, calling for the way to be prepared as He leads them home and removes every obstacle. In contrast to the fleeting nature of human power, God’s Word stands forever, offering a firm foundation for hope. The passage ends with a picture of God as both sovereign King and gentle Shepherd—strong yet tender—who draws His people close and leads them with compassionate care.

- 1. Kirk shared first about our tendency to seek comfort in nostalgia.** Where do you typically turn for comfort when life feels uncertain, and how do those sources compare to the comfort God offers in Isaiah 40?
- 2. “Comfort, comfort my people” (Isaiah 40:1).** What does it mean to you that God speaks comfort directly to His people in their suffering, and how does this challenge the way you view Him during difficult seasons?
- 3. Kirk’s message contrasted cultural anxiety with God’s comfort.** In what ways do you feel the weight of today’s anxiety-filled culture, and how does God’s promise of comfort speak into those pressures?
- 4. God brings comfort even after judgment and failure.** How does knowing that God comforts people who have failed or wandered change the way you approach Him with your own struggles or sin?
- 5. ‘God promises to “prepare a way” through the wilderness (vv. 3–5).** Where in your life do you feel like you are in a wilderness, and how might God already be at work bringing comfort by making a way forward?
- 6. “The word of our God endures forever” (v. 8).** How does the unchanging nature of God’s Word provide a deeper, more lasting comfort than the temporary comforts we often rely on?
- 7. God is both a powerful ruler and a gentle shepherd (vv. 10–11).** How does seeing both His strength and His tenderness together reshape your understanding of how God comforts His people?
- 8. Kirk talked about the Holy Spirit as the present source of God’s comfort.** Which aspect of the Spirit’s comfort (presence, assurance, intercession, peace, or strength) do you most need right now, and why?
- 9. Kirk also highlighted how the Holy Spirit comforts us through God’s people, the Church.** How have you experienced God’s comfort through God’s people in the past? Currently?
- 10. God’s ultimate comfort is rooted in His larger plan of restoration and new creation.** How does the hope of resurrection and God’s future renewal give you comfort in the midst of present pain or uncertainty?
